### **IBD BOOT CAMP HIGHLIGHTS**

This year the GHAPP National Meeting held its first boot camps, which were a great success. Registration reached capacity for the 4-hour ABCs of IBD Boot Camp led by Sharon Dudley-Brown, PhD, FNP-BC, FAAN, FAANP, and Elisabeth Evans, FNP-BC.

The session began by defining and describing inflammatory bowel disease (IBD). These chronic, relapsing, intestinal inflammatory conditions of the GI tract with autoimmune origins include Crohn's Disease (CD) and Ulcerative colitis (UC). The interaction and overlap of a patient's genetics, immune system, and environmental triggers impact his or her clinical presentation and response to treatment.

The diagnostic process for both conditions was also reviewed. Screening labs include fecal calprotectin or lactoferrin, CRP, and sed rate.



The boot camp also reviewed the many facets of IBD management, which includes the practice principle that maintaining remission is not the only goal of IBD management.



### **IBD BOOT CAMP HIGHLIGHTS (Continued)**

Other aims:	
Addressing psychosocial issues	
Detecting dysplasia and cancer	
Improving daily function	
Eliminating nutritional deficiencies	
Improving symptoms	
Treating inflammation and complications	
Minimizing adverse effects of treatment	



The treatment arsenal for IBD continues to grow. Immunomodulators, aminosalicylates, small molecules, biologics, and corticosteroids are the primary classes for treatments, but practitioners will also use supportive agents such as antidiarrheals, bile sequestrants, and anti-depressants as well as antibiotics such as ciprofloxacin.

Treatment strategies for UC are driven by patient risk for colectomy; whereas, treatment for CD is driven by patient risk for complicated disease.

UC patients high risk for colectomy:
Younger than 40, extensive colitis
Deep ulcers
Corticosteroid dependent
History of hospitalization
High CRP/ESR
C. difficile infection
CMV

CD patients that are at high risk for complicated disease:	
30 or younger at initial diagnosis, with extensive anatomic involvement	
Perianal and/or severe rectal disease	
Deep ulcers	
Prior surgical resection	
Structuring and/or penetrating pattern	

Health maintenance for IBD patients was also outlined. The recommended vaccination schedule for IBD patients, does not deviate much from the general population, except for early dosing of the pneumococcal and zoster vaccines. Live viruses should not be given to immunosuppressed patients. Cancer screening is also important for the health maintenance of IBD patients. Colorectal cancer is a major concern for patients with long-standing colitis, and the risk increases with the extent and duration of colitis.

This four-hour course surely fit the definition of a boot camp: short, intensive, and rigorous, and its attendees were able to take away clinical pearls and useful tips for nearly every aspect of IBD care.

### **HEPATOLOGY 101 BOOT CAMP HIGHLIGHTS**

The GHAPP National Conference this year was filled with so many great opportunities to learn from our peers and to gain insight into ways to improve our clinical practice as GI and Hepatology APPs. This conference caters to APPs in every category; whether you have been in GI and/or Hepatology for several years or if you are brand new to this specialty area, there is something for everyone.

One new special opportunity this year was the Hepatology 101 Boot Camp on Saturday afternoon. This two-hour course provided an important foundation for providers new to taking care of patients with chronic liver disease. It was also a beneficial review and update for providers who have been in hepatology management for a while.

The topics ranged from viral hepatitis (HBV and HCV) presented by Allison Hobbs, NP, where she detailed differentiating HBV from HCV for those new to GI/Hepatology, including the important blood tests to order and interpret for diagnosis. I had the pleasure of presenting fatty liver disease management, and my colleague Vicki Shah, PA-C had a presentation on abnormal LFTs.



Nurse practitioner, HoChong Gilles, did a great presentation on the

Nuts and Bolts of Cirrhosis Management. She did a comprehensive overview of the most important piece of advanced liver disease: managing those patients with portal hypertension. She presented a great mnemonic way of using PORTAL VEIN to remember the important pieces of cirrhosis management: portal hypertension, ascites, neoplasm (HCC), and esophageal varices just to name a few components.

The course finished with Sarah Dawkins, NP presenting on rare liver conditions: autoimmune hepatitis and primary biliary cholangitis. All of the speakers did an excellent, comprehensive job reviewing these topics for the audience in the allotted timeframe.

Overall, this boot camp was well-attended but still intimate enough that attendees felt very comfortable asking questions and presenting real-world patient cases to the presenters during Q&A. Hepatology 101 Boot Camp is something that I can see continuing during future conferences to come!

### National Conference Workshop Highlights and other news...

The Evidence-Based Practice and Research Committee held its first workshop at the National Conference in Nashville. "How to Rock a Literature Review: Strategies to Conduct a Search and Critique the Evidence" attracted attendees from practicing clinicians to those enrolled in master and doctoral programs. The workshop introduced the 5-step review strategy using Assess, Ask, Acquire, Appraise, Apply to provide structure for gathering evidence. Examples for formulating research questions and PICO (population/patient/problem, intervention, comparison, outcome) questions were presented, and the types of evidence were reviewed: primary and secondary research, and qualitative and quantitative research. Publishing strategies and tips were discussed.

The didactic session transitioned to small group work in which attendees applied the Johns Hopkins Evidence Appraisal Tool to one of two articles. Following the activity, each group explained the results of their appraisal so that all attendees had a better understanding of the full appraisal process. Feedback from the session was positive. The committee is excited to create another workshop for the 2023 GHAPP National Conference in National Harbor, Maryland.

Congratulations to Glenda Quinones, DNP, APRN, and her award for Best Poster at the 2022 conference. She submitted "Knowledge Awareness of Depression Screening in Individuals with Chronic Liver Disease among Healthcare Providers in Miami, Florida: A Quality Improvement Project," which was one of five APP posters displayed at the conference. In 2023, we hope to see your abstract submission. The submission portal opens in the summer and acceptance notifications go out in early August. All types of abstracts are welcome, including standard studies or research-based (review), quality improvement, evidence-based practice

implementation, process, and clinical vignettes or case reports.
